



Bus Tour to Chazy

An organized tour will be offered on Saturday afternoon. It will depart at 1:30 from Rugar Street directly in front of the Angell Center.

T he tour will visit the William H. Miner Agricultural Research Institute (1951), an experimental farm, with particular attention to its historical exhibit, and the Alice T. Miner Colonial Collection (1924), a museum of the Colonial Revival as interpreted by the wife of the Institute's founder.

A chartered bus will take up to 43 participants. This tour cannot run without a minimum number of participants. If it is cancelled, you will receive notification by e-mail one week before the conference, and a refund will be mailed to you after its conclusion.

Alternate Options

In addition to the organized tour, Plattsburgh and the general vicinity offer a number of options for historical touring on your own.

- **Plattsburgh museums** are open all day Saturday with free admission to mark Museum Day. A list with directions will be in your registration packet.
- *The Spirit of Ethan Allen II* departs from the foot of College Street, Burlington at 4 PM for a 90-minute lake cruise (\$15). Visit http://www.soea.com/ for more details.
- Fort Ticonderoga is open until 5 PM and is offering half-price admission (\$7.50) to those with conference name badges.
- Plattsburgh is only 20 miles from the Canadian border and only 64 miles from **Montreal**. Consider an afternoon tour of the old city, or extend your stay in the area and make a weekend of it.

Getting There

▶ Automobile

From the south, take Interstate 87 to Exit 37; turn right on Rte. 3 at the fork (traffic light) bear right onto Broad Street; at third light turn right into Kehoe Administration Building parking lot (#11–12); you may park in this lot, or continue through the lots and turn right onto Rugar Street, then an immediate left into parking lot (#16–17). The Angell College Center is directly across Rugar Street. Driving time is 2.5 hours from Albany, 5.5 hours from New York City.

Railroad

The northbound Adirondack leaves New York Penn Station at 9:20 AM, arriving at Plattsburgh station at 3:15 PM. The southbound Adirondack leaves Plattsburgh at 12:35 PM, arriving at New York Penn Station at 8:36 PM. Fare is \$62 each way. The train station is one mile from the SUNY Plattsburgh campus.
